

What do I need to show QCAT?

QCAT will usually want to see medical evidence that says you have capacity.

Having 'capacity' means you can make your own decisions about your money.

QCAT has a form called a <u>Health Professional Report</u>. You can take this to your treating doctor and ask them about filling it out.

It does not have to be in this form. For example, the health professional could write their own report or letter. It just needs to talk about your 'capacity' to make decisions.



What is a health professional?

The term 'health professional' isn't defined, but it's usually someone who has qualifications in the health field. This could be a doctor, psychologist, social worker, occupational therapist or registered nurse.

For example, a disability support worker is probably not a health professional. If there are different reports and opinions, QCAT will look at them and decide which evidence is better. They will consider things like how well the writer knows you and how qualified the writer is.

For example, a psychiatrist's report might usually be better than a report from a General Practitioner (GP). But if the GP has known you for a long time, and the psychiatrist hasn't, the GP's opinion might be better.

What if I can't find a health professional to say I have capacity?

It can be harder to have an administration order revoked if you don't have medical evidence, but it can be done.

There might be other ways you can prove to QCAT that you can handle your own money. For example, you might consider joining the Public Trustee's Financial Independence Pathway (link to fact sheet), or you might want to create your own budget.
